

Princes Highway Corridor Upgrade

Audio Tactile Line Marking

We are currently undertaking upgrades along the Princes Highway from Meningie to the South Australian / Victorian border to improve long term safety and efficiency for all road users. The upgrades are funded through the \$190 million Princes Highway Corridor Program, jointly funded by the Australian (80%) and South Australian (20%) governments.

What's happening:

We will be installing audio tactile line marking (ATLM) along the Princes Highway between Kingston SE and the South Australian / Victorian border. ATLM is used to reduce 'run-off-road' or cross carriageway crashes by creating a noise (audio) and vibratory (tactile) warning to road users who have strayed from the road lane.

How this affects you:

The Princes Highway will remain open to traffic at all times.

However, to undertake this work safely, there will be speed and lane restrictions in place during working hours, as the works progressively move along the Princes Highway. Please plan your trips, be cautious around workers, and follow the speed limits and signs. You will still be able to access businesses and homes. If we need to limit access, we'll let property owners know ahead of time.
